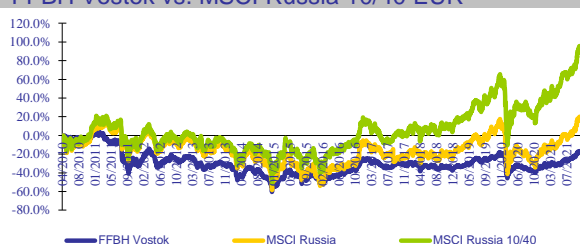

Investment objective overview

FFBH Vostok is a high-yield, actively managed, open-end mutual fund with regional focus on Russia & CIS, incepted on Apr 16, 2010. The Fund's investment objective is to achieve high long-term growth, bearing medium to high level of risk. The Fund may have up to 95% in equities and up to 50% invested in bonds.

We assume further recovery of the Russian economy in 2021, supported by several key rate cuts and relatively stable oil prices, and prefer higher allocation to equities and cyclical sectors. The portfolio remains comprised mainly of blue chip companies with leading and stable market positions.

FFBH Vostok vs. MSCI Russia 10/40 EUR

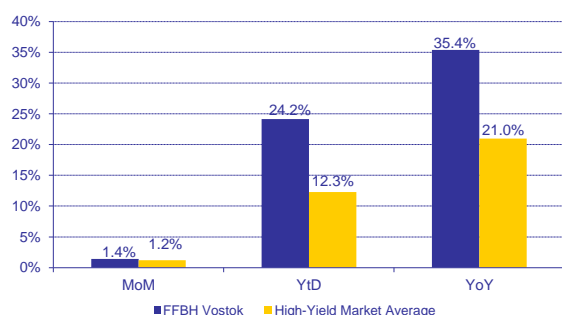

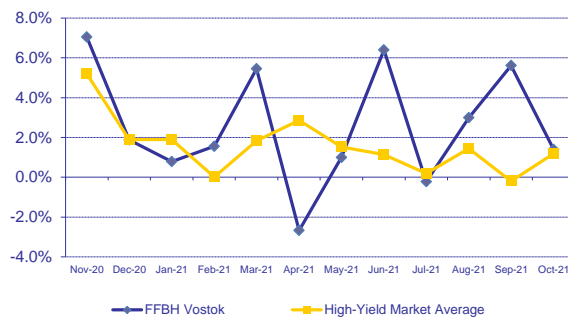

MoM, YoY and YtD return to HY market average*

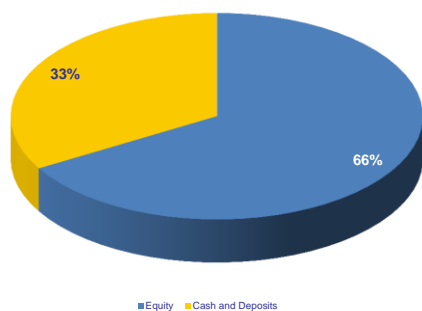


MoM return to HY market average*



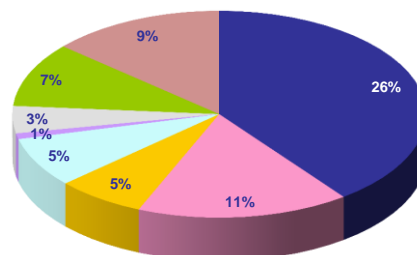

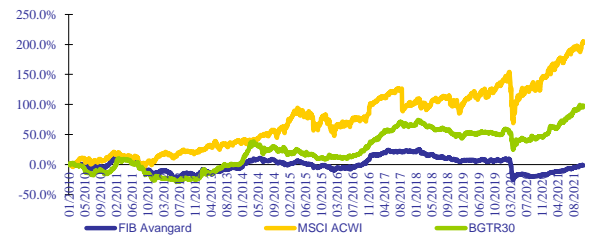

Investment strategy

FIB Avangard is a high-yield, actively managed, mutual fund, inception on Nov 11, 2007, whose investment objective is to achieve high long-term growth, bearing medium to high level of risk. Its portfolio is allocated into global equity with regional focus on Bulgaria. Tactically, most of its funds might be invested in capital markets outside Bulgaria that are expected to be among top performing world regions. FIB Avangard's investment strategy for 2021 includes allocation to export-oriented, financially stable and dividend-paying Bulgarian companies and allocation to developed markets blue chips based on favourable macroeconomic conditions and attractive valuations. We will increase exposure to companies with competitive positions in disruptive industries. The overall risk of the portfolio will be mitigated through sector and company diversification.

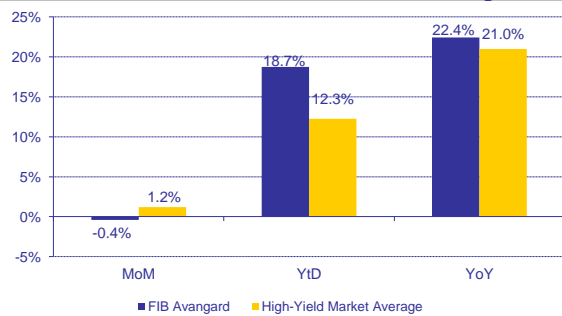

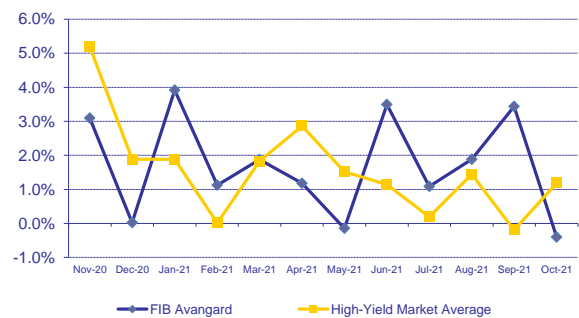

MoM, YoY and YtD return to HY market average*

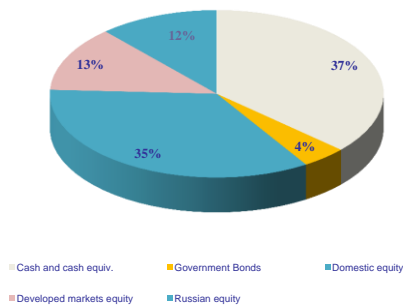


MoM return to HY market average*

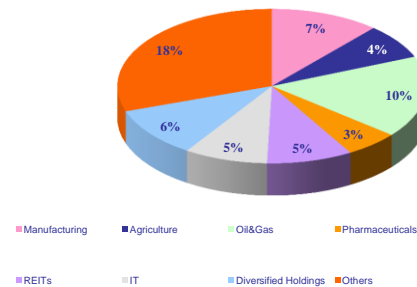

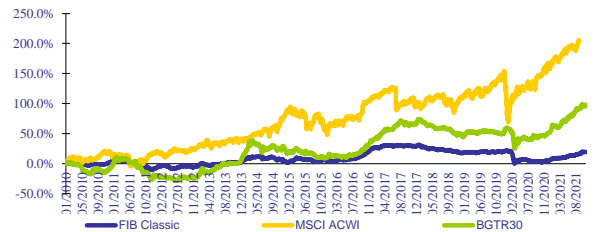

Investment strategy

FIB Classic is a balanced mutual fund, inception on Nov 11, 2007, whose investment objective is to achieve medium to high long-term growth of its assets, bearing medium level of risk. The Fund invests in equities and bonds, as the equity-bond proportion depends on the stage of the economic cycle and macro conditions in covered regions and the expected central banks' monetary policy decisions.

FIB Classic's investment strategy for 2021 remains equity-focused, which includes holding equity allocation close to the fund's limits. Equities will be concentrated in Bulgaria and Western Europe with preference to dividend-paying value companies. Bond portfolio would comprise of domestic and foreign corporate bonds.

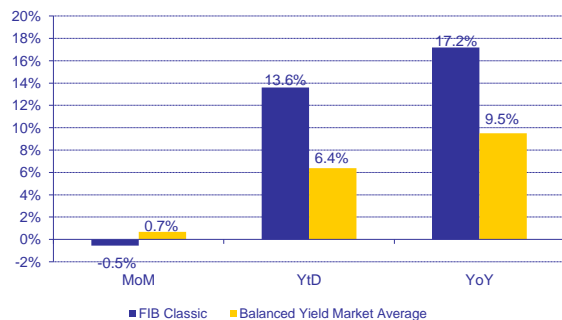

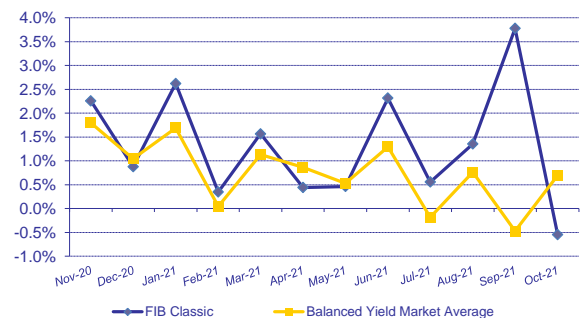

MoM, YoY and YtD return to BY market average*

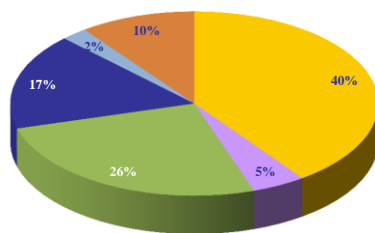


MoM return to BY market average*



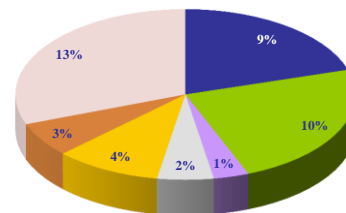

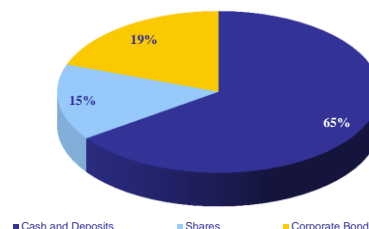

Asset Allocation



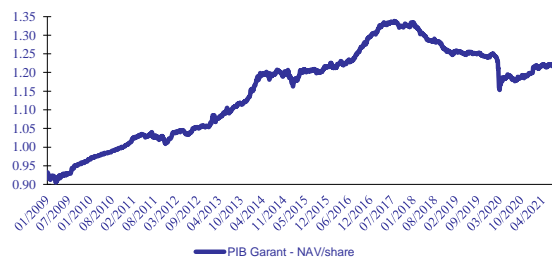

Investment objective

FIB Garant is a conservative mutual fund, inception on Nov 11, 2007, whose investment objective is to achieve medium long-term growth of its assets, bearing low level of risk. The Fund invests mainly in fixed-income and money market instruments, but it may have up to 20% exposure to equity used to improve its risk-return profile.

FIB Garant's 2021 investment strategy includes significant allocation to Bulgarian equities on valuations and sentiment improvement on the BSE. At certain points investments in foreign large cap dividend-paying blue chips can be made but currency risk should be controlled. Low local deposit rates would also lead to an increase in the Fund's exposure to foreign corporate and sovereign bonds.

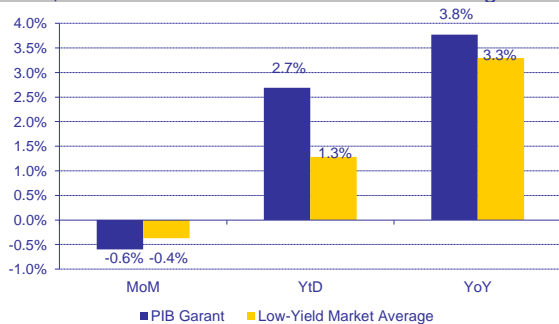

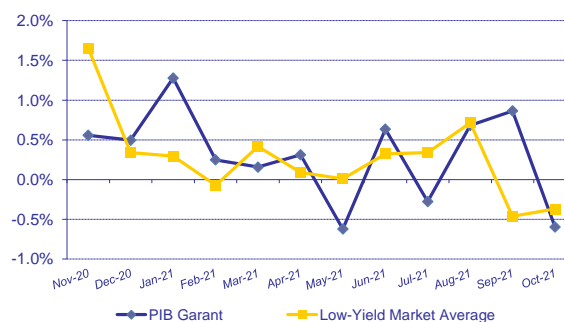

PORTFOLIO MANAGER'S COMMENT October 2021

MARKET OVERVIEW:

In October 2021 the financial markets recovered despite the rising inflation and the disruptions in the global supply chains. The pandemic evolved differently around the world, but the economic activity continued to recover. The IMF lowered its forecast for the global economic growth to 5.9% in 2021 and 4.9% in 2022 and expressed its concerns about the different paces of recovery in advanced and emerging economies. The OECD reached a deal on a global minimum corporate tax rate for large corporations of 15% leading to a fair taxation of more than 125 billion of corporate profits, where they were generated.

In the US the Senate passed a short-term increase to the debt limit by 480 billion dollars, allowing the government to operate normally until early December. The President reached a deal with the Democratic senators on his 1.75 trillion dollars social spending and climate bill, including child education financing, tax credits for utility and residential clean energy and electric vehicles, healthcare subsidies.

In Europe the prices of natural gas and energy continued to rise sharply leading to increased inflation expectations. The EU held meetings and discussions regarding the energy independence of the union and possible mitigation of the energy price increases.

US: S&P 500 increased by 6.91% MoM and NASDAQ 100 increased by 7.90% MoM in USD, with similar changes in EUR (increase of 7.13% MoM and increase of 8.12% MoM). The GDP rose by 2.0% in Q3 2021. The core inflation was stable at 4.0% YoY in September. The unemployment rate decreased to 4.8% in September.

The quarterly earnings for Q3 in the financial sector were better than expected, but technology companies reported mixed results due to the global chip shortage. The labor market slowed substantially and the economy created less than 200 thousand jobs in September. Wages increased sharply due to the persistent labor shortage and the rising inflation.

The FOMC minutes from the September meeting showed the readiness of the Federal Reserve to begin reducing the pace of its monthly asset purchases as soon as mid-November by around 15 billion dollars. The central bankers expressed concerns about the high inflation lasting longer than currently assumed. The manufacturing and services PMI data fell during the month. The retail sales and the industrial production decreased.

The government bond market fell due to the increased inflation expectations and the 10y Treasury yield rose to 1.56%. The US dollar appreciated slightly against the major currencies and closed around 1.1558 against the euro.

EUROPE: MSCI Europe increased by 4.54% MoM. The GDP in the Eurozone rose by 2.2% in Q3 2021. The core inflation increased substantially to 2.1% YoY in October. The unemployment rate fell to 7.5% in August.

The European economies operated under loosening pandemic restrictions and the companies restored their operations, but the Central- and East European countries experienced a sharp rise in the number of infections, resulting in additional measures.

The European Central Bank left its monetary policy unchanged and confirmed the moderately lower pace of net asset purchases. The ECB foresees inflation at 2.2% in 2021, 1.7% in 2022 and 1.5% in 2023.

On the energy market the prices of natural gas and electricity rose significantly leading to inflation pressures. The manufacturing and services PMI indices decreased. The retail sales increased slightly and the industrial production decreased.

The demand for risk-free assets decreased and the 10y German Bund yield rose, closing around -0.11%.

RUSSIA: MSCI Russia increased by 3.86% MoM in USD and increased by 4.06% in EUR. The GDP rose by 10.3% YoY in Q2 2021. The core inflation rate increased to 7.61% YoY in September. The unemployment rate fell to 4.3% in September. The Brent oil price increased to USD 83.68 per barrel (increase of 6.80% MoM).

Oil and energy prices continued to rise due to the increased demand and the lower than expected renewable energy production in Europe.

The country was heavily affected by the pandemic leading to partial or full lockdowns in the regions for a period of up to two weeks.

The Central Bank Of The Russian Federation raised aggressively its benchmark interest rate by 0.75 bps to 7.50% citing the rising inflation rate and expects the inflation to be within the range of 7.4% - 7.9% at the end of 2021. The central bank holds open the prospects of further rate hikes at its upcoming meetings.

The economy continued to recover due to the general increase of the commodities prices on the international markets whereas the industrial production increased substantially.

The Russian currency appreciated and closed around 70.95 rubbles per dollar.

BULGARIA: SOFIX increased by 0.55% and BGTR30 increased by 0.76%. The GDP rose by 0.6% in Q2 2021. The inflation rate (HICP) increased substantially to 4.0% YoY in September. The seasonally-adjusted unemployment decreased to 5.6% in August.

The economy operated under partial restrictions due to the increased number of infections. The industrial production increased whereas the retail sales decreased slightly.

OUTLOOK:

The global economy continues to recover from the pandemic related decline. The recovery depends on the path of the virus and the vaccination process. The financial markets are expecting slowing of the economic growth and higher inflation resulting from the increased demand for goods and services and the disruptions in the global supply chains. The governments and central banks are firmly committed to maintaining the fiscal and monetary stimulus aiming at sustainable economic recovery.

Monthly return /MoM/ is calculated as the ratio between the NAV/share as per the report date and the NAV per share on the last working day of the previous month.

Annual return /YoY/ is calculated as the ratio between the NAV/share as per the report date and the NAV per share on the last working day of the same month a year ago.

Year-to-date return /YtD/ is calculated as the ratio between the NAV/share as per the report date and the NAV per share on the last working day of the previous year.

Standard deviation is the annualized standard deviation of the weekly return over the last five years or since inception, whichever is smaller.

FIB Avangard: Monthly Alpha – MSCI ACWI is the difference between the monthly return of NAV per share of FIB Avangard and the monthly return of MSCI All Country World Index.

FIB Classic: Monthly Alpha – MSCI ACWI is the difference between the monthly return of NAV per share of FIB Classic and the monthly return of MSCI All Country World Index.

FFBH Vostok: Monthly Alpha – MSCI Russia is the difference between the monthly return of NAV per share of FFBH Vostok and the monthly return of MSCI Russia 10/40 Total Return EUR Index.

FIB Avangard: Beta (β) – MSCI ACWI has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FIB Avangard and MSCI All Country World Index over the last five years.

FIB Classic: Beta (β) – MSCI ACWI has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FIB Classic and MSCI All Country World Index over the last five years.

FFBH Vostok: Beta (β) – MSCI Russia has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FFBH Vostok and MSCI Russia 10/40 Total Return EUR Index over the last five years.

FIB Avangard: R2 – MSCI ACWI has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FIB Avangard and MSCI All Country World Index over the last five years.

FIB Classic: R2 – MSCI ACWI has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FIB Classic and MSCI All Country World Index over the last five years.

FFBH Vostok: R2 – MSCI Russia has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of FFBH Vostok and MSCI Russia 10/40 Total Return EUR Index over the last five years.

Returns of all indices presented in the bulletin or used in the calculations above are converted in BGN.

Sharpe Ratio for all funds has been calculated using the weekly returns of NAV per share of each fund over the last five years or since the inception of the fund, whichever is smaller, and using 0% as risk-free return.

FIB Avangard: High-yield market average is calculated through equal weighting of the returns of all high-yield mutual funds, offered on the Bulgarian market by asset management companies - members of the Bulgarian Association of Asset Management Companies (BAAMC).

FIB Classic: Balanced yield market average is calculated through equal weighting of the returns of all balanced mutual funds, offered on the Bulgarian market by asset management companies - members of BAAMC.

FIB Garant: Low-yield market average is calculated through equal weighting of the returns of all conservative mutual funds, offered on the Bulgarian market by asset management companies - members of BAAMC. Money market funds are not included in the calculation.

FFBH Vostok: High-yield market average is calculated through equal weighting of the returns of all high-yield mutual funds, offered on the Bulgarian market by asset management companies - members of BAAMC.

Returns are calculated using the net asset values of the mutual funds reported on the web site of BAAMC on the first working day of the month, following the month of performance presentation.

The market average points are calculated in a standardized way, using the MoM, YoY and YtD returns of each fund (R_i , $i=1$ to n), based on formula: $\sum (1/n \cdot R_i)$, where n is the number of mutual funds.

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
